can eye protection be see-through AND offer complete UV block?" The sunglasses you wear outdoors block UV rays and are still see-through, correct? Indoor eye protection products are exactly the same. They block damaging ultraviolet light, but allow visible light (a completely different light spectrum) through. The lenses of sunglasses and goggles are tinted to make our eyes more comfortable in the bright sun or a bright tanning bed. Sunglasses with very dark lenses don't block any more UV than those that are very lightly tinted.

Your salon guests prefer to take a nap while tanning? Several brands are much darker and better for a snooze. Darker eyewear is a great suggestion for your guests who may be nursing a hangover or those who often get headaches from the bright UV light.

The bottom line: your salon guests must protect their eyes when they tan! With dozens of different FDA compliant eye protection offerings available, your tanners will have the level of visibility needed to text, avoid claustrophobic feelings or take a nap during their sessions. Make sure you find out what they like to do while they're tanning so you can customize your eye protection suggestions to meet their needs!
